SUPPORT DISABLED CHILDREN GGARA

The project Support disabled children Ggaba is a project belonging to the slum area of Ggaba - an area of Uganda's capital Kampala, where the majority of inhabitants live from hand to mouth. Often the women are single mothers and responsible for the survival of the family.

In Ggaba there lives a lot of overlooked and neglected disabled children and young people. The disabled children are in worst cases hidden away in dog-houses. Being a disabled child is difficult. They are stigmatized and are often treated badly and are basically left alone.

The project in Ggaba aims to help disabled children and young people and their families. This is a project based on locally based initiatives. Behind stands Betty Nankabirwa and Sidsel Krarup Bjerrum. Betty is an experienced counselor within marginalized children and is the local passionate soul behind the initiative in Ggaba. Sidsel Krarup Bjerrum is the Danish driving force and experienced in social work.

The disabled children meet in Betty Nankabirwa's home, where she has created a space that is open for social activities and development. At the same time, it contributes to reducing the stigma that usually torments the disabled children and their families.

The disabled children get education, do sports, build friendships and are allowed to be a part of society. Much of the effort is also about ensuring parents' commitment and their understanding of childrens disabilities.

The money you donate goes directly to the project in Ggaba, so the disabled children and young people can continue to meet, develop and get professional help from physiotherapists, teachers and others with expertise in the field.


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
